WAYNE COUNTY

The Wayne County Board of Commissioners met in regular session on Tuesday, May 20, 2008 at 9:10 a.m. in the Commissioners Meeting Room in the Wayne County Courthouse Annex, Goldsboro, North Carolina.

Members present: Roland M. Gray, Chairman; Atlas Price, Jr., Vice-Chairman; Wilbur E. Anderson; John M. Bell; C. Munroe Best, Jr.; J. D. Evans and Efton M. Sager.

Members absent: None.

Work Session

During the scheduled briefing and prior to the regularly scheduled meeting, the Board of Commissioners held a work session to discuss the items of business on the agenda.

Closed Session

At 8:45 a.m., upon motion of Vice-Chairman Atlas Price, Jr., the Board of Commissioners unanimously declared itself in closed session to instruct the public body's staff or negotiating agents concerning the position to be taken by or on behalf of the public body in negotiating the price and other material terms of a contract or proposed contract for the acquisition of real property by purchase, option, exchange or lease and to consider the qualifications, competence, performance, character, fitness of an employee.

At 9:05 a.m., upon motion of Vice-Chairman Atlas Price, Jr., the Board of Commissioners unanimously declared itself in regular session.

Invocation

Vice-Chairman Atlas Price, Jr. gave the invocation.

Pledge of Allegiance

Commissioner Wilbur E. Anderson led the Board of Commissioners in the Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag of the United States of America.

Approval of Minutes

Upon motion of Vice-Chairman Atlas Price, Jr., the Board of Commissioners unanimously approved the minutes of the regular session of the Board of Commissioners on April 15, 2008.

Discussion/Adjustment of Agenda

Chairman Roland M. Gray adjusted the agenda by adding Social Services (3), Sheriff and Community Development Block Grant budget amendments to the Consent Agenda.

Special Recognition – Wayne County Clerk to the Board Marcia R. Wilson

The Board of Commissioners presented a plaque to Clerk to the Board Marcia R. Wilson for achievement of Master Municipal Clerk designation by the International Institute of Municipal Clerks. The designation of Master Municipal Clerk is the highest certification for a Clerk to the Board in the United States. Clerk to the Board Marcia R. Wilson is one of only three county clerks in North Carolina with this designation.

Special Recognition – Wayne County Information Technology Director Stephen P. Cross

County Manager W. Lee Smith, III introduced Wayne County Information Technology Director Stephen P. Cross to the Board of Commissioners. Mr. Cross stated he was happy to work for Wayne County, excited about the caliber of his staff and pleasantly surprised about the technology in Wayne County.

Public Hearing – Proposed Amendments to the Wayne County Zoning Ordinance and Map Concerning the Airport Height Overlay

At 9:21 a.m., the Board of Commissioners held a public hearing to receive public comments on proposed amendments to the Wayne County Zoning Ordinance and map concerning the airport height overlay.

Planning Director Connie Price reviewed the proposed text changes to the Wayne County Zoning Ordinance and proposed amendments to the Wayne County zoning map. The proposed amendments to the Wayne County Zoning Ordinance to be considered are:

- 1) Amend the Wayne County Zoning Ordinance by changing the following sections.
 - a) Re-title Section 50.8 Airport Height District of the Wayne County Zoning Ordinance as Airport Height Overlay.
 - b) Replace purpose with: The purpose of the overlay designation is to promote the safe conduct of aircraft in the vicinity of an airport, to prevent creation of conditions hazardous to aircraft operation, to prevent loss of life and property, and to encourage development which is compatible with airport use characteristics.
 - c) Replace the definition of Section 50.8.1 Permitted Uses with: Notwithstanding any other provisions of this Ordinance, no use may be established with the regulated area so as to interfere with navigation, radio communication, or otherwise create a hazard to aircraft operations.
 - d) Remove Section 50.8.3 Dimensional Requirements and replace with 50.8.3 Regulated Area. The area included in the Airport Height Overlay shall be shown on the Wayne County Zoning Map.
 - e) Add Section 50.8.4 Maximum Height Limits. Except as otherwise provided, no structure shall be constructed or maintained so as to exceed identified maximum imaginary surface heights less ten feet. The imaginary surfaces shall be computed using information from Federal Aviation Regulations, Part 77, “Objects Affecting Navigable Airspace,” promulgated by the Federal Aviation Administration and Department of Defense Uniform Facility Criteria 3-260-01, “Airfield and Heliport Planning and Design.”
 - f) Add Section 50.8.5 Sub-Areas. The Airport Height Overlay shall be divided into the following sub-areas. The sub-areas shall be designated on the Wayne County Zoning Map.
 - (1) Primary Surface (PS) This surface defines the limits of the obstruction clearance requirements in the immediate vicinity of the landing area. The primary surface comprises the runways, runway shoulders, and lateral safety zones. The length of the primary surface is the same as the runway length for the appropriate airport. The width of the primary surface is 2,000 feet or 1,000 feet on each side of the runway centerline.
 - (2) Clear Zone (CZ) This surface defines the limits of the obstruction clearance requirements in the vicinity contiguous to the end of the primary surface. The length and width of the Clear Zone are 3,000 feet by 3,000 feet.
 - (3) Approach Area (AA) This surface is symmetrical about the runway centerline extended, begins as an inclined plane (glide angle) 200 feet beyond each end of the primary surface at the centerline elevation of the runway end, and extends for 50,000 feet. The slope of the approach-departure clearance surface is 50 feet horizontally outward for each one foot vertically upward along the runway centerline extended (glide angle) until it reaches an elevation of 500 feet from the start of the glide angle. The width of this surface at 200 feet beyond the end of the runway is 2,000 feet; it flares uniformly, and the width at 50,000 feet is 16,000 feet.

- (4) Transitional Area (TA) Slopes 7 feet horizontally outward for each one foot vertically upward beginning at the sides of and at the same elevation as the primary surface and the approach surface, and extending to a height of 150 feet above the airport elevation. In addition to the foregoing, there are established height limits sloping 7 feet horizontally outward for each foot vertically upward beginning at the sides of and the same elevation as the approach surface, and extending to where they intersect the conical surface. Where the approach area projects beyond the conical area there are established height limits sloping 7 feet horizontally outward for each foot vertically upward beginning at the sides of the same elevation as the approach surface, and extending a horizontal distance of 5,000 feet measured at 90 degree angles to the extended runway centerline.
 - (5) Inner Horizontal Area (IH). The horizontal area is established by swinging arcs of 10,000 feet radii from the center of each end of the primary surface of each runway and connecting the adjacent arcs by drawing lines tangent to those arcs. The horizontal area does not include the approach and transitional areas. The height shall be 150 feet above the primary surface of the adjoining runway.
 - (6) Conical Area (CA) Slopes twenty feet horizontally outward for each one foot vertically upward beginning at the periphery of the Inner Horizontal area.
 - (7) Outer Horizontal Area (OH). This surface is a plane located 500 feet above the established airfield elevation. It extends for a horizontal distance of 30,000 feet from the outer periphery of the conical surface for Seymour Johnson AFB. It also extends to a line 50,000 feet from the north end of the Goldsboro Wayne Airport. Said line shall be 16,000 feet in length centered on the centerline of the runway extended.
- g) Remove from Section 61 of the Wayne County Zoning Ordinance “Note 6 Height-Slopes.”
 - h) Add to Section 41 of the Wayne County Zoning Ordinance “Word and Term Definitions” the following new terms.
 - (1) Airport shall mean either the Goldsboro – Wayne Airport, the Mount Olive Airport, or Seymour Johnson Air Force Base.
 - (2) Airport Elevation. The highest point of the airport’s usable landing area measured in feet above mean sea level.
 - (a) Goldsboro – Wayne Airport – 134 feet
 - (b) Mount Olive Airport – 168 feet
 - (c) Seymour Johnson Air Force Base – 109 feet
 - (3) Height. For the purpose of determining the height limits in the airport height restrictive area, the datum shall be 1987 North American Datum.
 - (4) Obstruction. Any structure, growth, or other object, including a mobile object, which exceeds a limiting height set forth in this ordinance.
 - 2) Amend the Wayne County Zoning Map by rezoning 5,272 acres north of the Goldsboro-Wayne Municipal Airport. The change will remove the glide slope known as Air Exclusion Zone and replace it with the Outer Horizontal Area. The maximum height in this area will be 500 feet above the runway elevation.
 - 3) Amend the Wayne County Zoning Map by establishing a maximum height zone on 81,335.76 acres surrounding Seymour Johnson Air Force Base.
 - 4) Amend the Wayne County Zoning Map by establishing a maximum height zone on 8,702 acres surrounding the Mount Olive Airport.
 - 5) Amend the Wayne County Zoning Map in the vicinity of the Mount Olive Airport by rezoning approximately 372 acres from Airport to Light Industry, establish Light Industry zoning on approximately 45 acres and establish Airport Zone on approximately 173 acres.

Maps of the areas subject to the proposed Airport Height Overlay are attached hereto as Attachment A.

A letter was received from Colonel Steven L. Kwast, 4th Fighter Wing Commander at Seymour Johnson Air Force Base, supporting the revisions to the Wayne County Zoning Ordinance concerning the proposed Airport Height Overlays. The proposed amendments reduce the potential for future conflicts that could negatively impact the mission capabilities of Seymour Johnson Air Force Base.

Laura Rachael Rouse stated her family wanted future generations to be able live on the family farm on Kelly Springs Road. By rezoning the property around the Mount Olive Airport, her family would not be able to raise their families on the property.

At 9:32 a.m., Chairman Roland M. Gray adjourned the public hearing.

Public Hearing – Request from Kenneth Wiggins DBA Wiggins Lumber to Rezone a 12 Acre Tract on US Highway 117 South Alternate from Residential-Agriculture 30 to Heavy Industry

At 9:33 a.m., the Board of Commissioners held a public hearing to receive public comments on a request from Kenneth Wiggins DBA Wiggins Lumber to rezone a 12 acre tract in Brogden Township on the east side of US Highway 117 South Alternate from Residential-Agriculture 30 to Heavy Industry. The current use of the property is forest land. The proposed use is saw mill. The property is bordered on the north by Oak Ridge mobile home park, on the east from CSX Railroad, on the south by forest land owned by the applicant and on the west by forest land and residential lots. A map of the property is attached hereto as Attachment B.

One of the purposes of the zoning in this area is to limit the density due to the frequency of aircraft from Seymour Johnson Air Force Base flying over the area. The property is in an area that has an average noise level of 65 ldn.

The Wayne County Planning Board recommended the 12 acre tract along the east side of US 117 South Alternate be rezoned from Residential-Agriculture 30 to Heavy Industry after looking at the goals in the Wayne County Comprehensive Plan, considering the recommendation from Seymour Johnson Air Force Base, and existing and planned land uses in the area.

Planning Director Connie Price stated officials from Seymour Johnson Air Force Base stated the preferred use of the property is Heavy Industry.

Arnold L. Flowers spoke in favor of the rezoning request.

At 9:39 a.m., Chairman Roland M. Gray adjourned the public hearing.

Approval of Request from Kenneth Wiggins DBA Wiggins Lumber to Rezone a 12 Acre Tract on US Highway 117 South Alternate from Residential-Agriculture 30 to Heavy Industry

Upon motion of Commissioner C. Munroe Best, Jr., the Board of Commissioners unanimously approved a request from Kenneth Wiggins DBA Wiggins Lumber to rezone a 12 acre tract in Brogden Township on the east side of US Highway 117 South Alternate from Residential-Agriculture 30 to Heavy Industry. A map of the property is attached hereto as Attachment B.

Appointment – Wayne County ABC Board Chairman

The Appointment Committee recommended the Board of Commissioners appoint Gregory Batts as Chairman of the Wayne County ABC Board for a term of May 20, 2008 through June 30, 2009. Thereafter, the term of appointment for the Chairman position of the Wayne County ABC Board will be from July 1st through June 30th of each year with the Wayne County Board of Commissioners making the appointment.

Upon motion of Commissioner Wilbur E. Anderson, the Board of Commissioners unanimously appointed Gregory Batts as Chairman of the Wayne County ABC Board. Mr. Batts' term as Chairman of the Wayne County ABC Board will begin on May 20, 2008 and will expire on June 30, 2009.

Upon motion of Commissioner Wilbur E. Anderson, the Board of Commissioners unanimously approved the term of appointment for the Chairman position of the Wayne County ABC Board to be from July 1st through June 30th of each year with the Wayne County Board of Commissioners making the appointment.

Board of Commissioners' Committee Reports

Commissioner Wilbur E. Anderson stated the Goldsboro-Wayne Airport Authority is running well.

Vice-Chairman Atlas Price, Jr. congratulated Lieutenant Alan Sauls with the Wayne County Sheriff's Office for being featured in *The County Connection*. He wished County Manager W. Lee Smith, III and Commissioner John M. Bell a belated happy birthday. He wished Chairman Roland M. Gray a happy birthday.

Commissioner J.D. Evans stated he appreciated the quarterly departmental reports.

ADLA, Inc. Structured Day Presentation

ADLA Structured Day Executive Director Danny King stated the mission of ADLA, Inc. is to help youth acquire the needed behavior and employability skills to function in a changing global society and to promote the understanding and practice of universal values of honesty, integrity and respect. The target group is students between 10-17 years of age in middle school and high school who have received short-term or long-term suspension from the Wayne County Public Schools or court orders from the juvenile justice system. ADLA, Inc. concentrates on providing students with positive classroom settings that are conducive for learning and concentrating on academics and providing sustainable programs that focus on character education, workforce development and anger management in order to develop a system of recovery for at-risk youth. This year approximately 350 youth will be served.

ADLA, Inc. also provides crime/gang prevention, drop out prevention, workforce development, youth entrepreneur training, academic enrichment and life skills classes.

ADLA Structured Day Executive Director Danny King thanked the Board of Commissioners for its support. Future expansion plans include a job coach and case management. The staff of ADLA, Inc. is committed to helping the lives of youth in Wayne County. He invited the Board of Commissioners to visit the facility.

The Board of Commissioners thanked ADLA Structured Day Executive Director Danny King and his staff for their dedication and commitment to the youth of Wayne County.

Foster Parents of Wayne County Proclamation

Social Worker III Terry Harne with the Department of Social Services stated 134 children are in the custody of Wayne County. There are 36 licensed foster care families with 8 more currently being licensed. Wayne County needs to support its foster parents. She invited everyone to attend a meeting between the Social Services staff and foster parents on June 7, 2008 at St. Paul United Methodist Church.

Foster Home Licensing Supervisor Rebecca Rouse thanked Social Services Director Judy Pelt for her support of the Wayne County foster care program.

Erin Kitchin, President of the Wayne County Foster Parents Association, introduced the children in attendance at the meeting. She thanked the Board of Commissioners for its support of the foster parent program in Wayne County. Foster parents provide a safe environment for children.

Upon motion of Commissioner Wilbur E. Anderson, the Board of Commissioners unanimously proclaimed May 2008 as Foster Parent Month in Wayne County and honored the Foster Parents of Wayne County, attached hereto as Attachment C.

Wayne County Adult Care Home Community Advisory Committee and Wayne County Nursing Home Advisory Committee Presentation

Regional Ombudsman Sheila Lewis stated she provided training and oversight to the Wayne County Adult Care Home Community Advisory Committee and Wayne County Nursing Home Advisory Committee.

The Wayne County Nursing Home Advisory Committee visited three nursing homes in Wayne County in 2007. The committee members were very active in community activities. The committee members continue to see the lack of direct care staff in long-term facilities.

In 2007 the Wayne County Adult Care Home Community Advisory Committee members visited nine family care homes with 52 beds and 14 adult care homes with 753 beds. The members visited each facility quarterly with follow-up visits made for concerns expressed by residents, families and community members. The members keep themselves informed on aging issues and efforts to educate the community on issues affecting residents in long-term care.

The members of the Wayne County Adult Care Home Community Advisory Committee and Wayne County Nursing Home Advisory Committee invited the Board of Commissioners to join them on a facility visit. Persons interested in serving on the Wayne County Adult Care Home Community Advisory Committee and Wayne County Nursing Home Advisory Committee were encouraged to submit an appointment application.

Falls Lake Dam Resolution

Upon motion of Commissioner C. Munroe Best, Jr., the Board of Commissioners unanimously adopted a resolution stating the Wayne County Board of Commissioners cannot support a change in current operation of the Falls Lake, which would negatively impact flood control along the banks of the Neuse River and water supply for citizens below the Falls Lake Dam and requested all counties, municipalities and affected persons along its bank be kept abreast of any further discussions of such a change in policy, attached hereto as Attachment D.

Secondary Road Program Resolution

Upon motion of Vice-Chairman Atlas Price, Jr., the Board of Commissioners unanimously opposed the transfer of the Secondary Road Program funding to the Primary Road Program and opposed any efforts by the North Carolina General Assembly or North Carolina Department of Transportation to shift any transportation costs formerly paid by the State to counties, attached hereto as Attachment E.

Request Legislature to Amend Session Law 2007-383 to Allow 911 Funds to Purchase Equipment for Outgoing Communications

Upon motion of Vice-Chairman Atlas Price, Jr., the Board of Commissioners unanimously requested the North Carolina General Assembly amend Session Law 2007-383 to allow the use of 911 funds for outgoing communication equipment.

County Manager's Comments

County Manager W. Lee Smith, III invited everyone to attend the US Highway 70 public work session on May 22, 2008 from 5:30 p.m.-7:30 p.m. at Wayne Center. Citizens will have the opportunity to view the US Highway 70 access management plan and freeway maps, as well as talk to Highway 70 Corridor Commission members and partners. The agenda will include a short presentation on the planning efforts for the corridor and will also give the public an opportunity to give input at various map work stations.

Wayne County offices will be closed on May 26, 2008 in observance of Memorial Day.

GATEWAY is promoting its "Dump the Pump and Ride GATEWAY" campaign.

Public Comments

Tom Drew stated the ideal education is invigorating.

Dr. William Plummer stated William Street needs to have crosswalk markings from the courthouse to the parking lot across the street.

Board of Commissioners Comments

Commissioner Wilbur E. Anderson welcomed Dr. William Plummer to the meeting. He invited everyone to attend the Memorial Day service on May 26, 2008 at 11:00 a.m. at Wayne Community College. He also invited everyone to visit Waynesborough Park to learn about Wayne County's history and enjoy the nature trails.

Chairman Roland M. Gray thanked everyone for participating in Relay for Life. The Wayne County Firemen's Association will meet tonight at Smith Chapel Volunteer Fire Department. He welcomed Mike Aycock, a member of the Wayne County Planning Board and Wayne County Firemen's Association, to the meeting.

Wayne County Public Schools Special Projects Funding

Commissioner John M. Bell requested County Manager W. Lee Smith, III support three items from the Wayne County Public Schools expansion budget in his recommended budget for 2008-2009. The requested items are another mobile classroom, teacher and assistant; summer school and expansion of security.

Commissioner C. Munroe Best, Jr. stated the three items should be funded as special projects. He questioned if the summer school program could begin this summer. Each item should be funded for two years. The Board of Commissioners and Board of Education would establish performance standards for each program. At the end of two years the programs would be evaluated upon the measurements of the performance standards.

Commissioner J.D. Evans stated each of the programs needs to be held accountable.

Work Session – Beaver Management Program

County Manager W. Lee Smith, III recommended the Board of Commissioners approve additional services in the beaver management program for 2008-2009, which would provide year round service for beaver management. The program would require appointment of a beaver management advisory commission, billing procedure and oversight by the County Manager's Office. The Wayne County beaver management program would be modeled after the Pitt County program, which has been successful for many years. The total program cost would be \$50,000 annually. Wayne County would bill for the beaver management service and recoup approximately 50% of the program costs. The Wayne County Planning Office would operate the beaver management program.

Commissioner C. Munroe Best, Jr. stated the beaver management program should have performance cost measurements to determine if it is beneficial.

Commissioner Wilbur E. Anderson requested information concerning trapping foxes.

Commissioner C. Munroe Best, Jr. suggested Commissioner Wilbur E. Anderson contact North Carolina Wildlife Commission Chairman Wes Seegars concerning trapping foxes.

Work Session – Requirement of Fire Hydrants in Certain Subdivisions

According to the minutes from the Wayne County Planning Board on March 11, 2008, the State of North Carolina will not allow regular fire hydrants if the State has determined there is insufficient water. Apparently, the fear is the fire trucks usage of water in the lines will make the water lines collapse. The State does allow a hydrant that functions to clean out the lines, but is not useful in fighting fires. The Wayne County Planning Board did conditionally approve a plat for Section 3C of Walnut Hill Subdivision based upon signatures on the certificates, stormwater calculations for this section and a disclosure note labeled on the map stating this section of houses is not supported by fire hydrants.

County Attorney E. B. Borden Parker stated the Board of Commissioners needed to be aware the county has regulations concerning fire hydrants, which the developers cannot comply with in certain areas of the county. Water districts only furnish residential potable water, not water for fire suppression or industrial use.

After discussion, County Manager W. Lee Smith, III stated he would recommend the appointment of a committee to develop a plan addressing the lack of fire hydrants at a future meeting. The committee should have representation from the municipalities, water districts, public health, planning and industry.

Opposition to Senate Bill 1309

Tax Administrator David Ward stated counties are divided into eight groups for an octennial revaluation schedule. Each county must conduct a general revaluation of real property in the base year for its group and every eighth year thereafter. A county may revalue real property before the end of the end of its eight year cycle. Wayne County cannot justify the cost of a four year mandatory revaluation. Revaluation in Wayne County costs over \$1 million. Therefore, he recommended the Board of Commissioners oppose Senate Bill 1309.

Upon motion of Commissioner C. Munroe Best, Jr., the Board of Commissioners unanimously approved and authorized a resolution opposing Senate Bill 1309 entitled *An Act Relating to Property Tax Valuation of Low and Moderate Income Housing, to Reduce the Discrepancy Between the Property Tax Value of Property and its Market Value and to Treat Mobile Homes the Same as Other Homes with Respect to Property Tax Liens* because it takes away a county's ability to determine its own reappraisal schedule and because of the costs for the county associated with more frequent reappraisals, attached hereto as Attachment H.

Vice-Chairman Atlas Price, Jr. requested the North Carolina Association of County Commissioners be informed of Wayne County's opposition to Senate Bill 1309.

Establish 2008-2009 County of Wayne Budget Public Hearing
